Tech Tales

Tall tales, strange but true, of the mysterious goings-on of Teachers and Students within those hallowed walls.

THE STRIKE! Jeffrey Tapping 1954-58

An incident occurred in the Leaving Honours class of 1958 which was reminiscent of an industrial dispute. The students in that class were just 25 remaining of the 70 or so who started together in 1954. At that time the Leaving Certificate (Year 11), was the normal entry point to university. Some elite schools, like The Tech, offered the Leaving Honours course which was at a level very close to first year University, and it was becoming increasingly recommended for those serious about advanced education. So all the students in L/Honours were serious and competent with ambitions for their future education.

Spencer Williams was the class teacher and also the maths master, known to us as "Spinny". He was a meticulous man, wearing a well-tailored suit with waistcoat, which he protected from chalk dust with a grey laboratory coat during classes. He had a high voice, which modulated up and down by about an octave, particularly when he was delivering one of his homilies, or waxing lyrical about the genius of William Shakespeare. He had quite a few annoying traits, but the one that got to us on this occasion was his drive to fill every second of our time with work.

We would usually wander into the classroom at the start of our day with hopes of a little time to socialise, prepare, relax and begin to get our minds up to speed. But Spinny would have none of this. As soon as we were in he was off, lecturing to us about something, sometimes simultaneously writing equations at enormous speed on the blackboard. Our tolerance was pushed to the limit and the whole class conspired, in future, to wait outside the classroom until the official starting time. On the first day of our action we all gathered, every last student, in the corridor. Spinny grew impatient in the room, waiting to get his usual flying start to the day’s lessons. He came out of the door and in a tremulous tone demanded to know what was going on. One brave student explained and the poor man almost had a fit. He herded us into the room, lectured us on the evils of our attitude for a few minutes, then declared that he was not going to teach the lesson to such an ungrateful crowd. So we all sat silently in our place, teacher and students, for the whole lesson time.

One of our number, Peter Sandery, spent the time revealing a talent new to us, verse writing. He penned a nine-stanza poem on the incident, and by chance I still have the original, yellowed and creased, but showing that it was run off in a single pass without alteration.

Ref: *Reg became the Head Geologist at Rio Tinto*

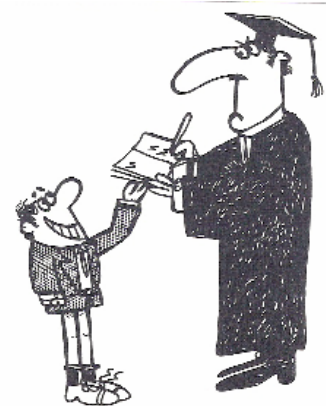
“Reg and his company quite probably did work for Rio Tinto but he would not have been employed directly by them, it would more likely have been in the role as a consultant.”
